



City of Atlanta: Population Change 2000 - 2010




- 2010 City of Atlanta Population – 420,003

Population Density




- The population density ranges from 1.13 persons per acre in Northwest Atlanta to 33.1 persons per acre in Midtown

City of Atlanta: Population Density - 2000 Census

























City of Atlanta - Racial Composition - 2000 Census Percent Hispanic Origin




City of Atlanta - Racial Composition- 2010 Census Percent Hispanic Origin






City of Atlanta - Racial Composition - 2010 Census Percent Asian Population





- The median age of the population is 32.9, an increase from 31.9 in 2000.













Persons per Household




- The average household size has been declining over the past decades from 2.4 in 1990 to 2.3 in 2000 to 2.11 in 2010.

Female Headed Households




- 16.5% of households are Female Headed Households.

Husband and Wife Households




- 23% of households are husband and wife households

Single Person Households




- 44% of households are single person households.

- A decline of 4.8% from 2000.


Households with persons 65 and over




- 7% or 29,484 of the population live in group quarters.


Housing Units



- The City of Atlanta has 224,573 housing units.
- This is an increase of 20% or 37,648 units from 2000.
- The map shows the housing density by census tract (units per acre).
- The housing density ranges from 0 housing units per acre to 29.7 and the median is 2.1 units per acre.
- The highest housing densities are in Downtown, Midtown and in Buckhead.



Housing Vacancy



- A little over 17% or 39,431 of housing units in the City of Atlanta are vacant.
- This is a sharp increase from 2000 when 10% or 18,778 units were vacant.
- The vacancy rate for rental units was 15%, higher than the 7% vacancy rate for owner-occupied units.
- Vacancy rates range from a low of 5% to a high of 55%.

Count Question Resolution

- The 2010 Census Count Question Resolution (CQR) Program is a mechanism for government units to challenge census population counts
- The CQR Program will address questions about housing unit and group quarters counts for three types of challenges:
 - Boundary (i.e. difference in city boundary limits)
 - Geocoding (i.e. population misallocated)
 - Coverage (i.e. missed or too many addresses)

The Census will NOT allow you to challenge:

- Total Population Count
- Household Size
- Demographic Characteristics

Count Question Resolution

- Count Question Resolution will accept challenge submissions from governmental units beginning June 1, 2011 to June 1, 2013.
- It is important to note that the Census Bureau will not collect any additional data or conduct additional surveys during this challenge process.
- Revision to the population and housing unit counts will result in the issuance of new certified 2010 Census counts. The US Census Bureau will use the CQR corrections to modify population estimated beginning in December 2012.

Count Question Resolution

- To date 73 cities have challenged the 2010 Census following the CQR process. Some of these are: Miami, and Washington D.C. and 5 local governments in Georgia.
- Challenges need to be made at the Census Block level. There are approximately 6,600 Census Blocks in the City of Atlanta.
- The City of Atlanta is soliciting bids to assist with challenging the 2010 Census.


