

Purpose of the meeting:

To solicit input from the public about the data analysis findings and potential future scenarios.

Key Comments:

- <u>Fix upstream to protect downstream</u>: Flood mitigation potential; flooding, stormwater surges need to be mitigated at their source, i.e., impervious surfaces
- <u>Prioritize high biodiversity areas</u>: protect high biodiversity through both private and public means. High quality tree canopy and native soils: and start in high social vulnerability areas as first phasing priorities. Conservation ordinance for private property.
- Provide explicit information about <u>habitat connectivity potential</u> across the city to help show the opportunities for conservation, restoration, or enhancement
- Concerns about the <u>impacts of trash</u>, <u>invasive species</u>, disease and pests on the ecological health of the city and how those pressures were considered in the analysis
- <u>Non-displacement of communities</u> as ecology improves!!
- Preservation to be balanced with greater density of development in core where allowed
- Interest in more <u>stream buffers and tree canopy</u>, as water quality and stream health is an important consideration
- <u>Education and awareness</u> that help community (people/government) prioritize ecology
- <u>Incentives for restore/clean stream buffers</u> (they are found all across the city, in all communities)
- Link forest rebuilding to building permits and tree removal cost to land value
- Future scenarios should be focused on <u>protecting high quality habitat</u>, wildlife and riparian corridors, <u>while integrating public use</u> and enjoyment AND some grey to green infrastructure in urban core
