Meeting the Need

Few people know the extent to which the Department of Parks and Recreation goes to meet the needs of all children, particularly those with special needs. That's where Coan Recreation Center comes in.

A therapeutic site, the center offers inclusive after school programming throughout the school year. During summer, youth ages 6-18 with mild to moderate cognitive and sensory disorders such as down syndrome, autism and cerebral palsy, participate in Camp Best Friends.

Activities include horseback riding, swimming, fieldtrips and gymnastics. An Atlanta Hawks and State Farm "Good Neighbor Club" site, Coan offers a unique sensory lab available to participants.

Incredible Commitment

Havalyn Brooks best known as "Ms. Hav," is Coan's Camp Director and has served as a camp employee with the City for 26 years! She is also a bus driver who transports special needs kids for Atlanta Public Schools, and has done so for the same 26 years. "These are the kids I choose to take my vacation with every summer," states Ms. Brooks. Facility Manager, Diallo Robertson began working with the City the same year as Havalyn. Pittsburgh: A Community of Firsts

Historically known as one of Atlanta's oldest Black neighborhoods, the Pittsburgh community has much to celebrate including a new outdoor basketball court made possible by Park Pride through a \$100,000 nonmatching Legacy Grant.

Located in Southwest Atlanta, <u>the Pittsburgh community</u> was founded in 1883 as a working-class suburb for African Americans, alongside the Pegram rail shops. "A lot of people may not know this, but Pittsburgh is one of the Atlanta communities that personified "Black Excellence" way before it was a "thing," shared Mayor Andre Dickens.

The community is also home to <u>Carrie Steele Logan</u>, founder of Atlanta's first orphanage for African American children. <u>Clark College</u> (1869) also relocated to Whitehall and McDaniel streets in 1871.

Pittsburgh continues its rich legacy of reimagining the community with engagement from Pittsburgh Association President John Floyd and Vice President Winfrey Young who were instrumental in contributing to the park's master plan.

The July 13 ribbon cutting was a full circle moment for many including City Councilmember Antonio Lewis. During remarks, he shared personal basketball moments growing up inside Pittman Park gym. Outside, on the all-new basketball court, Lewis showed off his basketball skills as Camp Best Friends campers enjoyed a refreshing, iced treat.

COMMISSIONER'S FAREWELL MESSAGE

While July is celebrated as National Parks and Recreation Month, I am reminded of all the great accomplishments we have made through the collaborative support of multiple City agencies, the philanthropic community, partners and City administration. Together, we have seen remarkable progress, often in the face of heavy social burdens. Yet, despite challenges, it is clear: Atlantans appreciate DPRs work and support our amazing parks and recreation system. It is one of the best in the nation!

Over the past four years, I have been tremendously grateful to serve as your Commissioner of Parks and Recreation. During that time, what we have achieved has been exceptional. Together, we have accomplished many things that better our system:

- Added nearly 1,000 acres to the park and trails system.
- Jumped from #49 to #27 in the 2022 TPL ParkScore rankings.
- Launched Activate ATL, DPRs first comprehensive 10-year master plan.
- Awarded by the U.S. Green Building Council for making Grant Park Gateway the first project in the world to earn Parksmart Bronze, LEED Silver and SITES Gold certifications.
- Attained Lake Charlotte Nature Preserve, one of the largest acquisitions in city history (216 acres).
- Built Browns Mill Food Forest, the largest in the nation.
- Completed several parks, including Kathryn Johnston, Cook, and Westside parks
- Installed a pedestrian bridge spanning the confluence of Peachtree Creek.
- Acquired Lower Paul Avenue Park, providing park access to the Chattahoochee River.
- Improved rounds and revenues year over year at our four golf courses.
- Reenergized Midnight Basketball.
- Established inhouse management of our five tennis centers.
- Improved attendance and enrollment of our legendary summer camp and afterschool programs.
- Delivered 18,611 meals to seniors; provided 100,000 free meals to afterschool students; conducted a virtual summer camp program; and created learning pods that served 200+ students all during the pandemic.

Simultaneously, our staff kept parks clean, safe and accessible.

DPRs mission is to provide equitable access to outstanding recreational, natural, and cultural experiences that enhance the happiness, health, and well-being of all Atlantans. Because voters passed the 2022 Parks and Recreation Infrastructure Bond, more can be done. Thanks to the City's leadership, DPR staff, volunteers and partners. Keep up the great work, great support, great advocacy, and great sacrifice on behalf of all Atlantans!
